Welcome speech by MC and welcome to country

Sarithya Tuy was MC for the proceedings. Meeting began by acknowledging the traditional owners of the land and explaining why this procedure is now important.

Sarithya thanked everyone for coming to the AGM which is held every year so that we can report to the members what is being done with the organisation and their financials.

Introduction of CAWC Management Committee Members and project workers and their projects

The Board of Management were then introduced one by one so that the members could meet and understand the role of each person.

The staff were introduced beginning with Ny and outlining her different roles. Cherry is taking care of newly settled members. Thin is currently in Cambodia on leave. He has several projects which he is responsible for. Y Hourng works with Ny taking helping with the elderly projects. Sok Im and Sok Chhin also assist with the elderly groups. Sundary also works with children's program.

Acceptance of last AGM's minutes

After perusing the minutes of AGM meeting last held on 4 December 2021 Michael moved that we accept minutes as correct and this was seconded by Ky Chea. (Must be a member who attended the meeting)

Presentation of this year's Annual Report by Sarithya

Sarithya then gave a summary of the annual report. We were given funds for various things including a mini van, homework program, computing class, playgroup, we have given out masks, we have survived lockdowns and reopening, we have applied for funds to build a centre with an office and a place to do activities for everyone and we are waiting on the outcome. We are also preparing to register to be able to receive donations and have deductible gift status from other organisations that give out funds. We have also been involved with food bank. We can share food from food bank for those who are struggling. We have also prepared a Youtube video set which is in Khmer and can assist with learning to drive a car in Australia.

Presentation of Financial Report by Lachlan

In Lachlan's absence, Ky reported on the financial situation.

We have an increase of \$112,544 income. Funds received were from clubs and also from various government departments. Grants increased by \$18,800. Because of COVID closures staff had to resort to Job Keeper funds but this helped maintain our staff in their positions. Our elderly project was down by \$51,000 because of COVID close downs.

After reviewing the financial statement audited by Alan Middleton, there was a motion to accept the financial report. Motion moved by Leap and seconded by Sophalla.

Motion to accept the Annual Report.

A motion to accept the Annual Report as presented was moved by Nara and seconded by Peter Ly. A motion to lodge the reports to Fair Trading was moved by Ravy Heng and seconded by Ky Chea.

Sarithya introduced Jackie Gavinel who is the returning officer.

Jackie declared all the positions vacant. Sarithya explained that the in order to proceed, we needed to vacate the positions.

Message from the President

It is my pleasure to present this year 's report to our members, partners and other stakeholders.

This year, CAWC has once again shown our resilience, collective tenacity and adaptability to thrive in the face of success in delivering much needed services to our community in a range of settings in obtaining external funding from a range of sources.

Our ongoing projects have continued to deliver great outcomes for the community. These include:

- 1. Settlement Engagement and Transition Support (SETS) program, funded by Department of Home Affairs through Settlement Service International (SSI).
- 2. Weekly Elderly Groups, brokered by Australian Unity, MARS (Multicultural Access and Referral Services), Project for People with Disability and Frail Aged People, delivered through brokerage arrangement with the Multicultural Network Inc. (TMT)
- 3. Dementia Link, delivered through brokerage arrangement with Dementia Australia

Separately from our ongoing projects, we have received the following new grants to undertake a range of activities for the community:

- 1. Cambodian Primary School Kids Support Program by Mounties Group through Club-Grants (\$18392) from 1st Jul 2022-30th June 2023
- 2. Digital Skills Training for Volunteers by Cabra-Vale Diggers through ClubGrants (\$13170) from 1st Jul 2022-30th June 2023
- 3. Cambodian Early Childhood Development & Parenting Support Project. Funded by Mounties through ClubGrants (\$12010) from 1st Jul 2022-30th June 2023.
- 4. DFSV Multicultural Grants from DFSV Multicultural Community Grant (\$94900) until 30th Jun 2024
- 5. Refugee Week Community Development Grants Program through Fairfield City Council \$2900)
- 6. Cambodian women's Hub Community Development Grants Program through Fairfield City Council (\$2970)
- 7. Cambodian Seniors Hub Community Development Grants Program through Fairfield City Council (\$2970)
- 8. Department of Industry, Science and Resources through Anne Stanley MP, Federal Member for Werriwa (\$10000)

Unfortunately, the application for West Invest Community Projects Grants was unsuccessful, which means we will not be able to build an office to accommodate the growing needs of our service. However, this new smaller office where we are meeting today has not weakened our commitment and dedication to serve the community as our staff members still show their dedication to deliver services to the community. Though, we will continue searching for appropriate funding to improve our office space.






Cambodian Primary School Kids Support Program 1st July 2022 – 30 June 2023

Cambodian Senior Support Program run by CAWC's staff supported by Fairfield City Council under Community Development Grants Program and Dementia Australia. The project is to provide free social support for Cambodian older people aged 55 and over to allow them to stay connected with each other and enable them to develop strengths and abilities to be independent in their own home. It also aims to combat social isolation, loneliness and keep older people more involved in community activities and help to access aged care support services. It operates every Thursday at BONNYRIGG HEIGHTS Community centre from 9:30am to 12pm.







Multicultural Access Referral Services has been continuing for almost 10 years now Assisting Cambodian people aged 65 and over who live alone or who need help to navigate

Assisting Cambodian people aged 65 and over who live alone or who need help to havigate their preferred services most suitable for their needs. This is a brokerage program provided through The Multicultural Network.



Dementia Program has been continuing almost 10 years now through a brokerage arrangement with Dementia Australia. The program has provided support for people who are living with dementia and their carers to engage with the care plan, find appropriate services, to promote awareness and organise group activities.



EDIE - Educational Dementia Immersive Experience







Domestic Family and Sexual Violence Project Report

The Cambodian-Australian Welfare Council of NSW (CAWC) is a non-profit organisation that aims to improve the quality of life of Cambodian-Australians residing in New South Wales. The CAWC team has recently launched a community project called "Combating Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence: It Takes the Community" (The DFSV Project) on July 1, 2023, which will run until June 30, 2024.

The DFSV Project's main objective is to provide comprehensive training and support to the Cambodian-Australian community, helping them recognise and combat domestic, family, and sexual violence. The project will offer capacity-building opportunities to community members, including workshops, a public forum, and bilingual educational resources, to enhance their knowledge and skills in identifying and responding to instances of violence.

The project's implementation strategy includes partnering with local community organisations and service providers to ensure that the training programs are culturally sensitive and relevant to the needs of the Cambodian-Australian community. The project will also provide resources and referral services to support victims-survivors of DFSV to help them recover from traumatic experiences and rebuild their lives.

The DFSV Project is a significant step towards creating a safer community for Cambodian-Australians, and the CAWC team is committed to working towards the project's success and ensuring that the community's needs are addressed throughout the project's implementation.

Target groups

The DFSV project aims to support around 300 Cambodia-Australian residents living in major cities like Fairfield and Liverpool City in New South Wales. The group includes 60 senior citizens and 150 refugees representing diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds, including Buddhist monks and practitioners, community leaders, volunteers, victims, survivors of DFSV, and Cambodian-Australian organisations.

It's worth noting that these clients have already participating in various social groups and programs offered by CAWC, such as the women's support group, youth group, early and dementia support group, and Buddhist monks. However, the DFSV project is tailored to meet their specific needs and requirements, which the existing programs have not addressed.

Work plans

The DFSV project is designed as a capacity-building initiative and does not offer one-on-one services to individual clients. Instead, it provides a public forum, expert-led workshops, and educational materials in both English and Khmer. During the project cycle, the following activities will be carried out by the project team:

Six workshops on DFSV led by experts to build capacity.

One public forum on DFSV

Development of bilingual materials on DFSV for the workshops and social media

The workshops and public forum will be conducted face-to-face at accessible venues while simultaneously live-streaming on the CAWC's Facebook page. An interpreter will also assist community members with limited English literacy.

1. The DFSV Project's Tri-fold Brochure

It was designed in Khmer and English and published on <u>CAWC's Facebook page</u>. Further, it was disseminated to target groups, the public, and key stakeholders on various face-to-face engagements.

2. Training Needs Assessments

To mark the inception stage of the DFSV project, a Training Needs Assessment (TNA) was conducted in August 2023 and participated in by_39 participants who were thoughtfully selected from different programs and social groups of CAWC, including the senior and dementia groups, women's support group, Youth Group, and Buddhist monks.

The primary goal of TNA was to gather crucial data and gauge the level of awareness regarding domestic, family, and sexual violence among

the Cambodian population residing in Fairfield and Liverpool City. Furthermore, it aimed to pinpoint the available resources to combat these issues.

3. Workshops on Domestic and Family Violence (DFSV)

These were designed based on the findings from TNA. These workshops are scheduled between October 2023 and June 2024 and aim to provide information and discuss DFSV and available support services. The topics covered in the workshops are as follows:

- 1. Domestic and Family Violence: Myths, Facts, Types, and Cycle of Violence
- 2. Sexual Violence: Harassment, Assault, Rape, and Police Interventions
- 3. Domestic and Family Violence: Support Services for Temporary Visa Holders
- 4. Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence: Coercive Control and Victims' Support Services
- 5. Sexual Violence: Consent

Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence: Roles of Religious and Community Leaders

Key stakeholders, including representatives from the Department of Communities and Justice, Department of Home Affairs, Sydney West Multicultural Services, and Immigration Advice and Rights Center, will facilitate the workshop.

4. (Workshop 1) Domestic and Family Violence: Myths, Facts, Types, and Cycle of Violence on 5th October 2023





5. Participation in the DV Launch Event and the Community Walk Against DV

Our team joined hands with other stakeholders to take part in the DV Launch Event at the Cabramatta Freedom Plaza to raise awareness of domestic, family, and sexual violence on November 9th, 2023.

SWS MARS Link Worker (Lao)

Omethip Phommachanh

This year is 2023. It is now my seventh year that I've been enjoying working at CAWC as a Multicultural Access & Referral Service (MARS) Link Worker which is one of the services of The Multicultural Network Inc. This project is funded by Commonwealth Homecare Support Programme.

My job is to provide information about My Aged Care (MAC), and related services to frail aged people who are 65 years old and over, and their carers from **Lao Community** living in the Bankstown, Fairfield and Liverpool LGAs. Though My Aged Care system has been established and utilised for a few years now, however it is still not widely known throughout Lao community. Therefore, I ensure that the community are kept informed.

Apart from educating community about My Aged Care system, Aged Care Quality Standards, and Charter of Aged Care Rights, I also support and assist clients to receive appropriate services to suit their needs, such as: Personal Care, Domestic Assistance, Social Support, Community Transport, Home Maintenance, and Respite Care from their chosen service provider/s. As well, I maintain contacts with them to continue the ongoing support for them - to see if they have any concern about any service provided, and their overall wellbeing. By doing this, it gives them the reassurance that they are not neglected and isolated.

In 2023 MARS (TMN) has a lot of activities and promotions provided to communities, for which I have participated in, such as:

In February – holding an information booth at Seniors Expo in Fairfield.

In June – holding an information booth at Wellbeing/Reablement Expo in Bankstown.

In August – a launch of a video about My Aged Care (on Zoom) in various languages which includes Lao.

In September - Aged Care and Activities in Edensor Park.


- Job-sharing is itself quite challenging and requires a lot of communication, even when one of us is off duty.

BONNYRIGG KHMER SCHOOL 2023 REPORT

The Bonnyrigg Khmer School is a community language school run by volunteer teachers and a parent management committee with funding support from the NSW Community Language Schools Program and a parent annual per child \$100 contribution. The school teaches Khmer language, literacy and traditional dance during school term to some 94 primary and secondary school students each Sunday morning in classrooms at the Bonnyrigg Primary School, next to the Bonnyrigg Khmer temple. The school, which receives government funding and Public Liability and Worker Insurance cover through its affiliation with the Cambodian-Australian Welfare Council (CAWC) of NSW Inc., has been in operation since 1991.

School promotion in the community is key to our success. As in previous years, school information stalls were held at Khmer New Year and Pchum Ben events at Bonnyrigg and Canley Vale temples and led to increased student enrolments.

This year, we were again successful in receiving grant funding (\$11,400.00) from the NSW Community Languages Program through CAWC. The school also applied for and received a further \$3,968.00 Department IT grant for purchasing a laptop, Microsoft Office software, two iPads and two Bluetooth speakers. The school now has a total of five iPads for teacher use and 16 iPads for students use in class, supported by a 4G mobile WiFi. With these additional resources, teachers have been able to integrate new language learning apps into their lessons each Sunday and students are showing increased engagement in their Khmer language learning. The school also applied for \$30,000 over the next two years from the Commonwealth Community Language Schools Gant program to i) purchase additional IT resources so all classes can participate in computer-assisted language learning each week and ii) provide language teacher training to preschool aged children. We are waiting to hear the outcome of our application.

At the beginning of term 1 each year, teachers review students' progress and organise classes according to their Khmer language levels. This year, the Deputy principal, Ms Chivy Im, teaches Class A (Pre-school to Year 1); Ms Theavy Lu-Spiteri teaches Class B (Years 1-3); Ms Morn Nim and Ms Meardey Yang team teach Class C (new enrolments and catch up in Years 3-5). Ms Sophanna Uy teaches Class D (Years 4-7); Miss Monica Lychan teaches Class E (mixed levesls Years 5-8). Our Chairperson, Ms Mary Raum, also assists teachers in Classes A and B. Our dancing teacher, Ms Lisa Nagatsuka, leads the school's Khmer dancing program. Ms Sorathy Michell assists teachers especially on classes with mixed levels. A huge thank you to all our dedicated teachers who give up their time each Sunday to teach our children Khmer!

During the year, we trialled enrolling preschool-aged siblings in Chivy's Kindergarten class. Preschool aged children attend class in period 1 and are picked up by their parents after the break. The children have settled in well and we are planning to expand the program next year and provide early childhood education training to all teachers.

This year's professional development program has been a busy one with three in-house teacher workshops in first, second and third terms, teacher attendance at the Federation of Community

Languages Schools Annual Conference in April, effective communication and financial literacy workshops, and teacher and Committee member participation in an accredited First Aid course.

The school owes its successful operation to the parent committee who meets regularly to manage school finances, administration and enrolments. The school's Annual General Meeting was held on 28 May attended by the school committee, teachers and parents. Congratulations to the following people elected to the school committee for 2023-2024: Chairperson: Mary Raum; Vice-Chairperson: Sokuntheary Soo; Secretary: Michael Michell; Assistant Secretary: Srey Sorn; Treasurer: Linda Zambrano; Assistant Treasurer: Sok Eang Heng; General member: Sary Chan.

We look forward to continuing to serve our community and families through our weekly teaching program to maintain and develop students' Khmer language and culture.

Arts and Culture Annual Report 2023

It is my great privilege to present to the members, associates, community and all concerned the Cambodian Living Arts and Culture of NSW Inc. (CLAC) annual report for 2023. It has been a tremendous five years for CLAC. We continue to preserve, maintain, and develop Khmer traditional arts and culture for current and future generations of Cambodian Australians.

The organisation provides support and assistance to adults, teenagers, and children over 5 years of age to maintain physical, social, and emotional wellbeing, through preserving the skills and knowledge of traditional Cambodian arts and culture; benefiting the Khmer community and introducing the beautiful ancient and modern art forms to the broader public through performance and participation in multi-cultural events.

CLAC dance classes operate as per the school term and we also participate and perform in many events annually. The participants have a very busy schedule - we meet once a week, therefore we keep in contact by checking each other's health and wellbeing with the help of social medial such as Facebook Group Chats and video calls on Messenger, Zoom, WhatsApp as well as communicating by phone and email.

It was an incredible and successful outcome for us that CLAC's performance showcase for a Creative Community Grant were funded by Fairfield City Council for the project titled "United Khmer Arts and Culture." The project was completed in April and the participants had the opportunity to attend creative workshops, learn how to dance, do role play, artwork, singing and learning traditional musical instruments from skilful musicians, artist, and dance teachers. At the end of the project, our students performed for community audiences and showcased newly acquired talents performing with live traditional band music. This project really helps and improves the mental sociological for many families and individuals. They meet and make friends and form great bonding as families grow closer in culture.

On December 2022 CLAC had the great honour to be invited to be Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) Advisory Group members for Australia War Memorial Development project to assist and guide the Memorial's Gallery Development. This is a very significate task and greatly benefits Khmer people in the community. Khmers will be able to share their stories through multimedia, display their artifacts or keep in the archives stories and information that has been hidden for many years and have never yet been revealed to those outside the community. Now it is our opportunity to show to the world and the present and future generations who can study first-person real-life story experiences and artifacts. It a three-year project expected to span from 2022-2025.

This year CLAC youth dance group was nominated for Creative Arts and Outstanding Youth Group for Fairfield City Mayor's Youth Achievement Awards 2023. Amazingly CLAC group won two awards. The children are really happy and received a wonderful experience.

The Cambodian-Australian Welfare Council (CAWC) is a very substantial service provider that supports the people in the Khmer community, including our CLAC association. CLAC continues its valued affiliation with CAWC affording Public Liability insurance cover for our performers.

Throughout the year CLAC were able to operate and maintain our service for the participants and their families' members, using existing instrumental equipment such as our Ronnet, Khems, drum and the costumes purchased last year from CAWC funds for the purpose of our event performances.

This year CLAC members and families were very delighted to participate in the events and performed for Australian Day, The Refugee Week, Community Kitchen group and voluntary for Elderly group.

With the support of CAWC, CLAC families and members were able to receive essential service such as information updates and participated in fun outing activities, educational workshops and events.

CAWC invited CLAC team to join an 'Effective Communicative Collaboration Skills' workshop. This workshop helped members to improve and build their confidence in communication and how to easily approach other people. We are proud to say that CAWC organisation have many skilful and professional staff that strive and work continuously to understand what Khmer people need and want for their daily lifestyles here in Australia.

Khmer Community (KC) is always in the heart of CLAC and it been five years since we have been sub-committee members. KC provide so much strength and support to CLAC by including us in many events, charity fundraisers, workshops and family fun activities.

Getting the assistance from KC helps CLAC continue to achieve many visions and progress every year. At this present we work and connect with the same communities through our many performances. Also, we are building further connections and friendship with other communities such as the Tibetan community and CLAC's dance group did a performance for Buddhist Prayer festival. The families and members experience and learn about their culture the simplicity, patience, and compassion. This festival educated us well especially how to guide our young children to enlighten themselves and make the right choices and be humble.

CLAC members was invited to join the important workshop 'Suicide Prevent' and many were interested and participated in the training. This program was very valuable in that it taught how we can help others by reflecting on what they had learned with the knowledge they have to save someone they know, their loved ones or themselves.

'Kid Kitchen' is a wonderful program organised by KC, for children to take part and handle food properly, alongside their families and relatives, while meeting and socialising with friends and other people and have an enjoyable time interacting and eating authentic Khmer cuisine.

KC 'BeLive' program on Face Book (FB) page helps increase the viewers because it is in Khmer, and ideal for those who are struggling with reading, writing, and listening as English. Therefore, CLAC's families and members can access useful information easily from KC website and FB page. The Khmer Community members work very hard to try to provide the needs of Khmer-Australians.

Cambodian Buddhist Society (CBS) and CLAC management team worked closely together to organise Khmer New Year celebration, Pchum Ben and Karten. We received positive feedback from the public. CBS are very supportive allowing CLAC to use their facilities for rehearsals or to get ready for event performances. CLAC very blessed to be part of Cambodian Buddhist Society events and festival celebration, and to have such a beautiful place at which to perform. Many parents are so grateful to see their children participate in Khmer celebrations and festivals at the temple. They all feel safe, secure, and experience a sense of belonging.

The Bushido Judo Club at Canley Vale committee members are so generous as they continued to support CLAC's use of their facility for dance practice every Sunday from 1:30pm to 4:30pm.

Fees

The annual fee remains the same \$100, the Family contribution fee is \$35 and membership \$5 (at least one parent needs to become a member). We accept Creative Kids Voucher \$100 per child; this certainly covers the annual fee. When a family has used the voucher for other creative events and have financial difficulty we waive their fee, they only need to pay the Family contribution fee.

The Benefits

All participants enjoy new experiences and creatively mix and match skills, materials and resources into useful props and outfits for the performers. They share knowledge, support other

families and children in need such as school updates, community service information and healthy food.

Everyone benefits both psychological and physically as they can connect positively with the community and their heritage, building up self-esteem through live performances, improved knowledge and social skills through cooperation with others all whilst physically exercising. At the end of the events and end of the year, CLAC members gather with families and friends, bring a plate of food to share at the training centre, member's resident or gather together having a picnic in the park.

Challenges

CLAC has big vision and to succeed need support with budget, financing is the main challenge. Performances each require different costumes, props, accessories and cosmetics, transportation to the event and essential food and drink.

CLAC is seeking any generous donation to support the organisation and welcome anybody interested in being involved or performing.

Lastly, on behalf of CLAC I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to CAWC, KC, CBS, KBS board committees, Bushido Judo Committee, all the members, parents and children for their support and dedication throughout the year.
